OVERVIEW

The Weinberg Foundation provides approximately \$100 million in annual grants to nonprofits that provide direct services to low-income and vulnerable individual and families, primarily in the US and Israel. Grants are focused on meeting basic needs and enhancing an individual's ability to achieve self-sufficiency with emphasis on older adults, the Jewish community, and the Weinberg Foundation's priority communities of Maryland, Northeastern Pennsylvania, Hawaii, Greater Chicago, Israel, and the Former Soviet Union.

In the following pages, the Foundation has identified selected grants of \$50,000 or more, serving basic human needs and health, that were approved during the past three years. During that time, the Foundation approved 83 grants totaling \$31.7 million. Of the total funds approved, \$29.1 million has been paid to date.

- Awarded \$2 million to support the renovation of Sarah's Hope, a shelter for families with children who are experiencing homelessness. The shelter converted an old school building into a welcoming space where families have their own private rooms. This project includes an early childhood education center on site, operated by Kennedy Krieger, serving 24 children ages 6 weeks to 3 years. Since the building re-opened after the renovation, the average length of stay in the shelter has decreased from 139 days in 2015 to 97 days in 2016.
- Continued to create new units of permanent supportive housing with 10 grants totaling \$6.1 million. Several projects, including Crescent Square in Virginia Beach and North Capitol Commons in Washington, DC, combine units for formerly homeless individuals with units for people earning up to 60 percent of the area median income. These buildings feature services on-site provided by a trained case manager who connects individuals to health care, mental health and substance abuse treatment, and employment opportunities.
- Awarded 8 grants totaling \$3.3 million to expand food bank facilities around the United States. The majority of these projects focus on increasing the amount of food distributed, with a particular emphasis on constructing more cold storage to handle perishable produce and protein. For example, nearly 40 percent of the 6.1 million pounds of food distributed by Food Gatherers in Ann Arbor, Michigan in 2015 was fresh produce.
- Provided \$6.9 million to 14 Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) throughout Maryland, Pennsylvania, and 7 other states. The funding opportunity to support FQHCs nationally was a one-time partnership between the Weinberg Foundation and the United States Health Resources and Services Administration with the goal of increasing the number of patients served at each facility.

In addition to responding to hundreds of nonprofit grant requests each year, the Weinberg Foundation engages in proactive grantmaking. These grant programs address some of the most critical challenges facing our communities by supporting best practices and promoting change through collaboration and collective impact. As part of its commitment to proactive grantmaking, the Foundation has approved up to \$1.5 million, over three years, to the Front Door Rapid Re-Housing program operated by St. Vincent de Paul of Baltimore.



The goal of the program is to move families quickly out of homelessness and into permanent housing using case management and financial assistance. Families assume responsibility for paying rent and utilities after the program ends. The Front Door program has just completed its second year. Abt Associates has been evaluating the program and will produce a final report in early 2018. Here are a few highlights from the first two years:

- 116 families with 298 children were placed into permanent housing
- 60 adults who entered the program unemployed obtained iobs
- 104 families have completed the program
- Families received an average of \$5,417 in financial assistance over a period of 4.7 months

CLIENT SUCCESS STORY

Ms. Brown was referred to the Front Door program by 211 United Way. She and her two children were evicted illegally. Ms. Brown and her family stayed in a hotel, funded by Front Door, for 21 days. Even though she had the income to afford housing, she had several past evictions which made it even more challenging to find housing. However, with Front Door's help she was able to find a landlord that was willing to give her a chance. Ms. Brown received case management and rental assistance for four months. She has been housed for nine months now and is maintaining permanent housing. Ms. Brown has also maintained employment as a result of being permanently housed. She no longer has the stress of trying to find a place for her family to sleep.
