

# OVERVIEW

The Weinberg Foundation provides approximately \$100 million in annual grants to nonprofits that provide direct services to low-income and vulnerable individuals and families, primarily in the US and Israel. Grants are focused on meeting basic needs and enhancing an individual's ability to achieve self-sufficiency with emphasis on older adults, the Jewish community, and the Weinberg Foundation's hometown communities of Maryland, Hawaii, Northeastern Pennsylvania, and Israel.

In the following pages, the Foundation has identified selected grants of \$50,000 or more that were approved and distributed within Maryland during the past three years. During that time, the Foundation approved nearly **300 grants** totaling **\$102.5 million**. Of the total funds approved, **\$64.7 million** has been paid to date.

### YEARS, THE WEINBERG FOUNDATION HAS

- Launched Baltimore City's Early Childhood Initiative and Better Together, which seek to ensure children enter kindergarten healthy and ready to learn. Since 2011, the Weinberg Foundation has committed a total of \$20 million to increase access to early childhood education. Over the next three years, \$4.6 million of these funds will enable an additional 650 children and 900 families in Baltimore to receive high quality early childhood education and family support services.
- Promoted youth literacy by supporting new and renovated libraries in Baltimore City Public Schools. The Foundation has committed \$10 million to create up to 24 new libraries as part of the Baltimore Elementary and Middle School Library Project. A total of 11 Weinberg libraries are already open, as of September 2015, and serving more than 5,500 students.
- Developed and initiated *Together We Care: Making Maryland by 2020 the Best Place to Grow Old*.

  The ultimate goal of this effort is to provide a "no wrong door" approach in Maryland to a variety of services and supports for older adults. To date, the Weinberg Foundation has provided \$4.4 million in grants to build the framework for this initiative that will create a model of comprehensive care allowing more older adults to age with dignity and independence.
- Supported Baltimore City's Journey Home plan with the priority of making homelessness rare and brief. The Weinberg Foundation has awarded a grant of \$2 million to support the renovation of Sarah's Hope, the largest shelter for homeless families in Baltimore. The Foundation also has awarded a grant of nearly \$1.5 million over three years to St. Vincent de Paul to expand rapid re-housing for homeless families in Baltimore City.
- Strengthened our hometowns through \$13 million in grants to umbrella organizations that distribute funds for direct services within the Foundation's priority areas. These organizations include Associated Black Charities, Associated Catholic Charities, Inc., The ASSOCIATED: Jewish Community Federation of Baltimore, and The United Way of Central Maryland, Inc.



# GRANT MAKING



**The Baltimore Elementary and Middle School Library Project** The Baltimore Elementary and Middle School Library Project (the Weinberg Library Project), now involving nearly 40 partners, works with Baltimore City Public schools to design, build, equip, and staff new or renovated libraries in selected schools where existing public funds can be leveraged.

Each new library includes the latest learning technologies; thousands of new books; and dedicated spaces for study, research, and instruction as well as for parent/guardian visits. The Weinberg Foundation has committed a total of \$10 million to create as many as 24 of these inspirational spaces, nearly half of which are now open serving more than 5,500 students.

We are already seeing results! In just three years, the number of books checked out increased from just over 9,000 to 46,000 per school year - a more than 300% increase! To learn more about the Library Project, please visit www.baltimorelibraryproject.org.



**Early Childhood Initiative** Since 2011, the Weinberg Foundation has committed a total of \$20 million to early childhood education - including \$4.6 million in funding that will enable an additional 650 children and 900 families to receive high quality early childhood and family support services, including childcare, home visiting, and parent and family support.

In 2014, The Weinberg Foundation celebrated the opening of two early childhood centers located within Baltimore City Public Schools. These centers are the first of five which the Foundation will support in Baltimore City, created as part of existing public schools and designed to care for children from birth to age five.



**Together We Care - Making Maryland the Best Place to Grow Old** Demonstrating its commitment to preserving the dignity and independence of the poorest and frailest older adults, the Weinberg Foundation has set a course to identify and implement the best practices in supporting both informal and paid caregivers.

The ultimate goal of this effort is to provide a "no wrong door" approach in Maryland to a variety of services and supports for older adults. Of particular concern are low-income, older, chronically ill individuals who are still able to live independently despite functional disabilities related to mobility or personal care.

By 2020, the Weinberg Foundation hopes to make Baltimore and all of Maryland the best place to be a caregiver or care recipient.
