Recent Weinberg Foundation Grants in Metropolitan New York



With total assets of approximately \$2 billion, The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation is one of the largest private foundations in the United States.

The Foundation's sole purpose is to assist the poor through operating, program, and capital grants to direct service organizations primarily located in Maryland, Hawaii, northeastern Pennsylvania, Israel, and the Former Soviet Union. The Foundation's annual grantmaking totals approximately \$100 million and is focused on meeting basic needs such as shelter, nutrition, health, and socialization and on enhancing an individual's ability to meet those needs. Within that focus, emphasis is placed on serving older adults and the Jewish community.

Just within the past three fiscal years, the Weinberg Foundation has administered over 60 grants with a total value of more than \$29 million throughout metropolitan New York. These grants are reflected in this summary which the Weinberg Foundation invites you to review.
