



# Grants to the Older Adults Community

## Hello from Baltimore!

The Weinberg Foundation is committed to keeping in touch with its many grantees, partners, and other stakeholders. The Foundation believes grants overviews like this one are a vital part of the communications process. These overviews highlight selected grants within each of the Foundation's program areas as well as within broader communities of funding, all reflecting the Foundation's mission of meeting basic needs and enhancing an individual's ability to meet those needs. Within that context, emphasis is placed on older adults and the Jewish community, both nationally and in our global "hometowns" including metropolitan Baltimore, Hawaii, northeastern Pennsylvania, Israel, and the Former Soviet Union.

With total assets of approximately \$2 billion, and annual total grant distributions of nearly \$100 million, The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation continues its legacy of caring for low-income, vulnerable older adults. The program area of Older Adults is the largest single area of Foundation grantmaking. No other American foundation of similar size has emphasized care for low-income, older adults to this extent. Every year, in fact, roughly 30% of all Weinberg Foundation grants are directed toward programs, services, and capital projects benefitting older adults.

In the following pages, the Foundation has identified selected grants of \$50,000 or more that were approved or distributed during the past three fiscal years to organizations serving older adults. We are pleased to report that, during that time, the Foundation *approved* grants for older adults totaling more than **\$65 million**. In addition, the Foundation *paid* more than **\$69 million**; a total investment of

\$134 million in the security and well-being of the most vulnerable and needful of our older population.

### Here are just a few recent highlights:

- The Foundation awarded a **\$10 million grant to Levindale Hebrew Geriatric Center and Hospital** in Baltimore, which is the largest gift to a residential center for long-term services and support in the Foundation's history. The grant is part of a just-completed construction project that will set a new standard for excellence in care for chronically-ill older adults. Levindale's new facility is now open to residents.
- The Weinberg Foundation is now seeing significant results from its three-year, national funding program, **The Caregiver Initiative**. The \$15.4 million project, including an **\$8.4 million** Weinberg Foundation grant, involves 14 nonprofits nationwide. The Initiative has identified and highlighted innovative and evidence-based community projects which help family and friends care for chronically ill or disabled low and moderate income older adults. This is believed to be the largest national initiative focused on best practices for caregiver services and supports. Additionally, recognizing the need for improved training for paid caregivers, the Weinberg Foundation has committed more than **\$1 million** to a pilot program in New York State that will demonstrate best practice recruitment and training.



- The Foundation committed just over **\$2 million** to GEDCO (Govans Ecumenical Development Corporation) for Maryland's first Green House residence for older adults, **The "Green House" Residences at Stadium Place**. Located in Baltimore's Waverly community, The "Green House" Residences at Stadium Place is another example of Weinberg Foundation leadership in the "culture change" approach to residential care of older adults.
- The Weinberg Foundation provided a **\$1.5 million capital grant** to support construction of the **Institute on Aging** in San Francisco. The Institute opened its doors in April, 2011 offering low-income, frail older adults in the Bay area access to affordable health care, housing, and supportive services.

The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation is privileged to partner with a wide array of direct services providers, as well as governmental agencies and philanthropic organizations, to help older adults who are in the greatest need. That collaborative effort is reflected in this summary report which the Foundation

The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation is one of the largest private charitable foundations in the United States, funding nonprofits that provide direct services to poor and vulnerable people, primarily in the U.S. and Israel.

Foundation grants are allocated through several program areas and are focused on meeting basic needs such as shelter, nutrition, health, socialization, and on enhancing an individual’s ability to meet those needs. Older Adults and Workforce Development are national programs while Basic Human Needs & Health; Disabilities; Education, Children, Youth & Families; and General Community Support fund direct service providers in the Foundation’s “hometown” communities of metropolitan Baltimore, northeastern Pennsylvania, Hawaii, and Israel. The Maryland Small Grants Program (MSGP) includes all Foundation grantmaking areas.

In the past three fiscal years, The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation approved or paid grants totaling \$134 million to organizations serving older adults.
