Grantmaking Highlights

2018-2021

The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation is dedicated to meeting the basic needs of people experiencing poverty by supporting nonprofits that provide direct services in the areas of Housing, Health, Jobs, Education, and Community Services. Grantee organizations serve a range of populations, including older adults, women at risk and their children, people with disabilities, and veterans, as well as the Jewish community. The following are key results of the Foundation's grantmaking between 2018 and 2021.

Select Highlights

- Funders Together to End Homelessness Baltimore: Supported coordination of \$12 million in annual investments from over 10 Baltimore-area foundations to align with public and private funding to support housing stability and prevent homelessness in the region.
- Oahu Housing Now (Hawai'i): Provided a \$100,000 grant and collaborated with local foundations and community development financial institutions to cover costs and expenses required to launch an \$11 million federal housing program, which helped 800 people quickly secure housing during the height of the pandemic.



Select Highlights

- PACE (Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly): Awarded \$7 million in capital grants to help build 14 PACE centers, which provide comprehensive health services for older adults. Nationwide, PACE centers served more than 58,000 individuals.
- Federally Qualified Health Centers: Provided \$27 million in grants to 19 centers, which served 365,000 patients.
- Housing Upgrades to Benefit Seniors: Invested \$9.3 million in this collaborative effort to provide home modifications, repairs, and supportive services to over 2,500 older adult homeowners, enabling them to remain independent and in their homes.



Select Highlights

- National Fund for Workforce Solutions: Network of 34 regional collaborative efforts that engage nearly 2,500 employers and leverage close to \$385 million in local funding to increase employment opportunities for about 92,000 workers and iob seekers.
- Wage Record Study: Launched partnership with Baltimore funders and University of Baltimore to support study of pre- and post-training pay for participants in Baltimore employment and training programs. Early finding: Participants in a training program for lab associates saw their annual income nearly triple, from \$15,069 to \$44,292.

Select Highlights

- Baltimore Summer Funding Collaborative: This joint effort, which involves 13 funders (up from three in 2015), awarded \$5.3 million in grants to support 93 high-quality summer programs for city children and youth in 2022. The collaborative directly funds programming for 6,000-9,000 students every summer.
- The Baltimore Elementary and Middle School Library Project: Committed \$15 million to this multiyear, collaborative effort to transform Baltimore City Public School libraries in neighborhoods where many students face academic and economic challenges. Early results: Improved third-grade reading scores (94 percent increase at two of the first schools) and a 400 percent rise in book checkouts over a four-year period.

Select Highlights

- CDFI Initiative: Provided grants to three community development financial institutions (CDFIs) to increase access to capital for nonprofits during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Foundation's \$7.5 million in grants to CDFIs has helped raise an additional \$20 million in capital and benefited 17 nonprofits led by people of color.
- Central Baltimore Partnership: Supported this multivear strategy to strengthen neighborhood services and increase opportunities for residents in three city neighborhoods. Among its results: creating summer jobs for 50 youths; launching case-management services to connect 125 families with living-wage jobs and the support they need to thrive; and creating a network of 33 community organizations to help residents access health care, food, and youth enrichment activities.
